Lyman IS 6th Grade Choir Syllabus

COURSE DESCRIPTION/OBJECTIVE

Students will learn techniques and skills to create and perform while collaborating with others in a choral setting. They will connect music with history, cultures, and society. This is a participation and performance-based course. Out of school performances are required.

CLASSROOM RULES AND EXPECTATIONS

- 1. Sing
- 2. No food, drinks (water is acceptable in a clear container), gum, candy, etc.
- 3. Be in your seat, ready to work, when the bell rings
- 4. Have your music with a pencil at all times (no pens please)
- 5. No excessive talking
- 6. No homework in class
- 7. No cell phones or other electronic devices

Assignments, Evaluations, etc. – 2% Daily Participation – 49% Concert Attendance & Behavior – 49%

ASSIGNMENTS, EVALUATIONS, etc. (2%):

Every music class will have class specific items that will account for **two percent** of the student's grade. These items may include clinic/festival participation, other performances, other performance tests, post-concert evaluations, theory assignments, etc.

DAILY PARTICIPATION (49%):

The participation grade will comprise **forty-nine percent** of the student's quarter grade (98% during first quarter, due to no performances being scheduled during that time) and is based primarily upon an individual's classroom behavior and that individual's ability to follow classroom rules and directions. Students not in band will also be required to complete a certain quota of sight-reading assignments in class every Monday and Wednesday, which will also affect the participation portion of the student's grade

Students will receive **nine points per quarter** for their participation grade. Failure to perform any of the aforementioned will result in a one-point deduction from the original nine points. Also, please note that students will be charged for lost or damaged music.

CONCERT/PERFORMANCE ATTENDANCE (49%)

Performances make up **forty-nine percent** of the student's quarter grade. Grading will be based on concert behavior, attire, and attendance. (See pg. 3 for behavior expectations.) Missing a performance will result in a "0" for that event. Please notify Mrs. Clark or Mr. Willie of any conflicts by Sep 1st. In the case of extreme illness, please call as soon as possible **before** the performance, even if school is missed on the day of a performance. Work is not and will not be considered an excuse for missing a concert or performance. Students are responsible for the following performances:

- Christmas Concert Dec 15
- 5th & 6th Choir Concert Mar 11 (7 pm)
- Final Concert May 18

CONCERT ATTIRE

All male choir members will wear a collared shirt and tie, slacks (no jeans), dark socks, and dress shoes (preferably dark in color; no tennis shoes), while ladies must have dresses or skirts, knee-length and below. Additionally, all concert attire must comply with school dress code policies.

MAKE-UP POLICY

The Six Rules of Concert Etiquette (for performers)

1. Refrain from talking

The first and greatest rule. It also includes whispering during the music.

2. Please tap fingers or feet quietly

The musicians do not need your help, and your neighbors need silence. Learn to tap your toes quietly inside your shoes—it's a good exercise to reduce toe fat.

3. Please have nothing in your mouth, besides your teeth and tongue

Gum and candy are not allowed.

4. Do not flip hair, wear watches with alarms, or jangle jewelry

Not only does this send the impression that you don't care, but the added percussion is disturbing to everyone around you.

5. Do not sigh with boredom

If you are in agony, keep it to yourself. Your neighbor just may be in ecstasy, which should also be kept under control.

6. Do not wave to your parents (or anybody else) during the concert

After all, they do know who you are, and they know you are there; they most likely brought you to the concert.

7. Do not read nor play with a toy in your pocket

To listen means just that. Use the time to turn on a "video screen" in your mind and create a story to the music.

The Eleven Rules of Concert Etiquette (for audience members)

1. Refrain from talking

This is the first and greatest rule. This rule includes whispering to or talking to your neighbor.

2. Refrain from unwrapping noisy candy wrappers during the performance

If the composer wanted to include crinkly paper noises to the music, he/she would have written it into the parts.

3. Do not open and close your purse nor rip open your velcro wallet

The best plan is to leave purses, etc., back at school or on the locked bus.

4. Turn off pagers, cell phones, and watch alarms

While many phones and pagers now have very symphonic-like rings, they don't always fit into the musical score, nor do they provide pleasant sounds for your neighbors.

5. Do not wave to (or make faces at) your friends or siblings during the concert

They, too, know you are here. You can talk to them after the concert is over.

6. Do not take flash photography

You don't want anyone to walk off the edge of the stage from flash blindness, do you?

7. Please do not walk down the center aisle with your video camera

Video cameras work just as well from the back of the auditorium (besides; the light is usually not good enough for video taping anyway.)

8. Do not leave as soon as your portion of the concert is over

All of the students deserve a full audience for their performances. Remember, next time your song could be last!

9. Applaud at appropriate times

Some music has several sections. Remember, it's not over until all of the sections have been performed.

10. Do not leave the auditorium during the music

Wait for a break in the concert to visit the restroom or to do anything else that probably isn't all that important anyway. The same goes for re-entering the auditorium, as well.

11. Do not wander around the performing venue

There's a reason concessions aren't sold outside the auditorium. One of those reasons is to prevent children from running in and out during the performance. Pick a seat, stay there, and only get up during emergencies.

THE GOLDEN RULE

Do not embarrass your teacher, your parents, or your school; a/k/a DON'T BE STUPID

Remember that you are representing your school, and you want to be on your best behavior. There are many eyes looking at you both on stage and in the audience.
